Public Health Orders

- [COVID-19 Relaxing Phase 2](#) (effective June 12, 2020) - [Emerging Wisely](#) provides a five-part plan taking the territory from containment measures through four phases of eased measures. Emerging Wisely identifies what requirements must be met to begin moving into each phase, and includes progressively eased restrictions on people, businesses, and activities important to residents. A pictorial [summary](#) is also available of the five phases mentioned above. Relaxing Phase 2: Next Steps started on Friday, June 12, 2020.
- [COVID-19 Directed at Mineral and Petroleum Industry](#) (June 25, 2020) – Requires mining and oil and gas industries to implement measures to protect public health and continue safe operations at all mining and gas projects in the NWT.
- [Travel Restrictions and Self-Isolation Protocol](#) (Amended December 1, 2020) – Restricts travel within the NWT that originates from outside the territory, with detailed exceptions. Provides instruction on following self-isolation protocols as applicable by self-isolating for 14 days in Yellowknife, Inuvik, Hay River, or Fort Smith and complete a self-isolation plan within 24 hours. On March 4, 2021 an exemption to the health order was issued allowing residents to self-isolate in Norman Wells and Fort Simpson.

- The Territorial Public Health Emergency has been extended until April 13, 2021.
- On December 10, 2020 the Federal government announced that the NWT will receive enough of the Moderna COVID-19 vaccine to immunize 75% of the adult population.
- On February 7, 2021 the Department of Health & Social Services updated the [NWT Vaccine Strategy](#), a guiding document to successfully plan and communicate vaccine distribution. The [COVID Vaccine schedule](#) outlines when residents of the 33 NWT communities can expect to receive the COVID-19 vaccine.

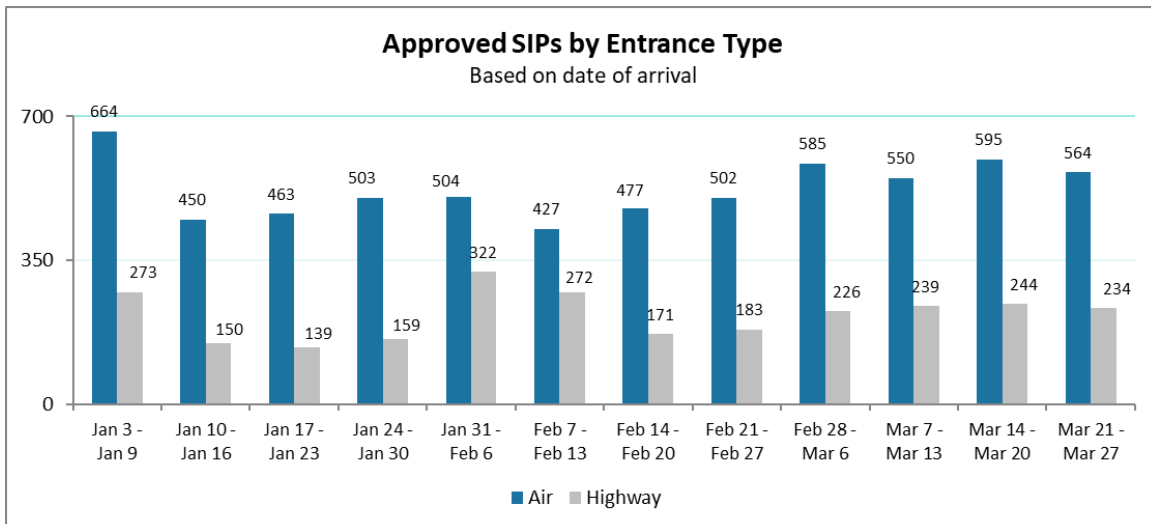
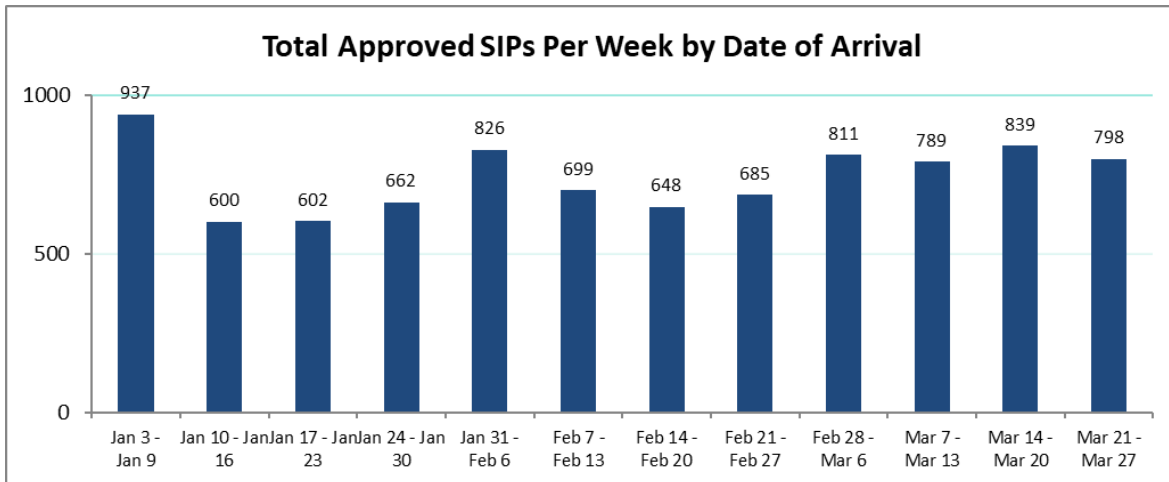

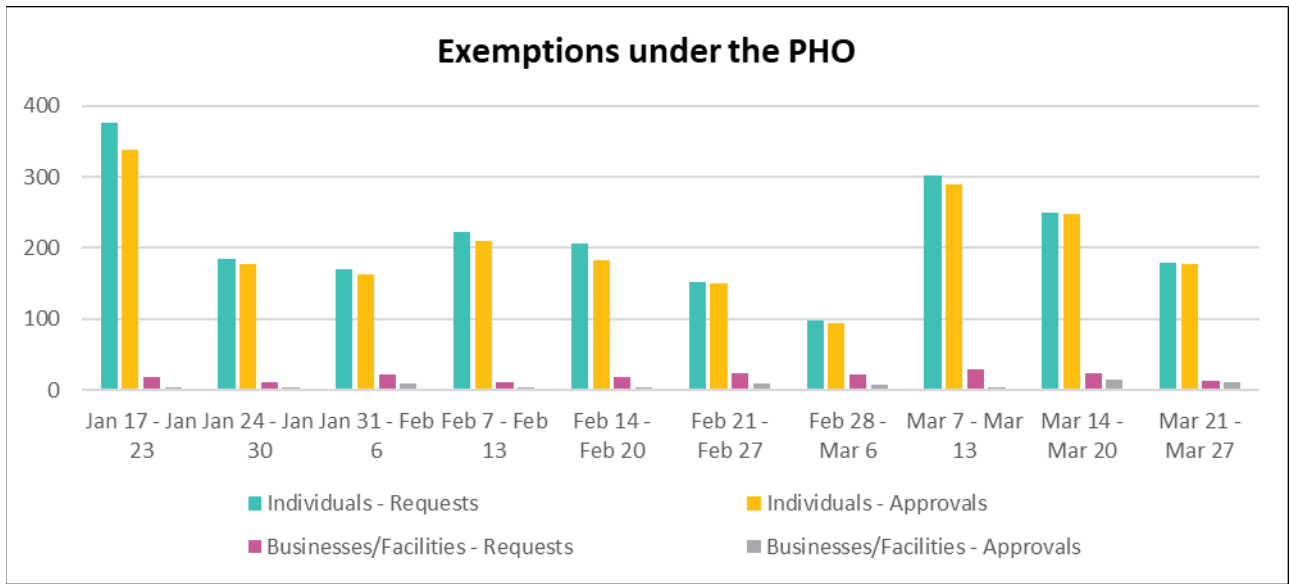
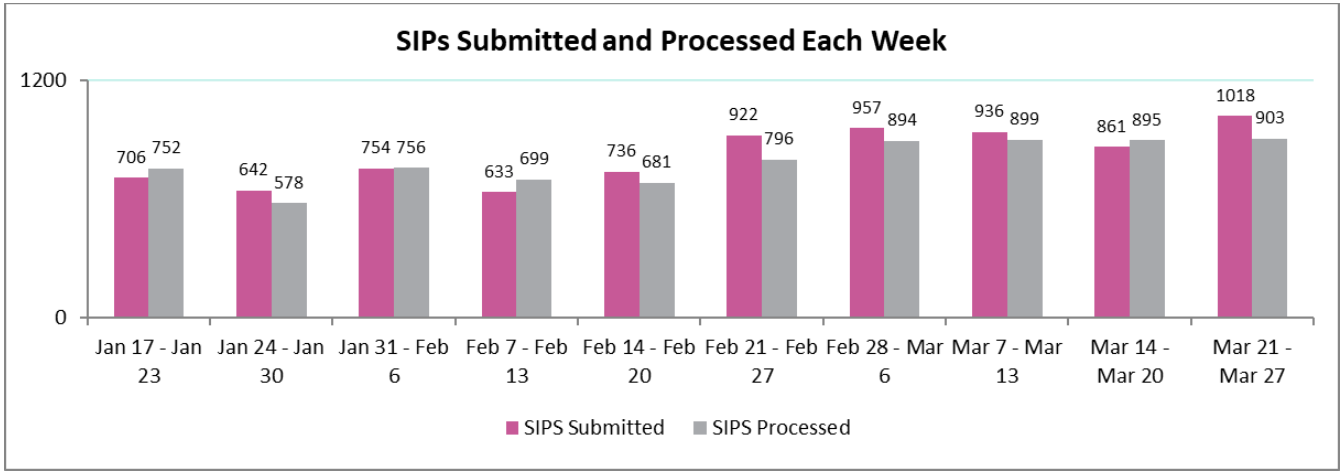
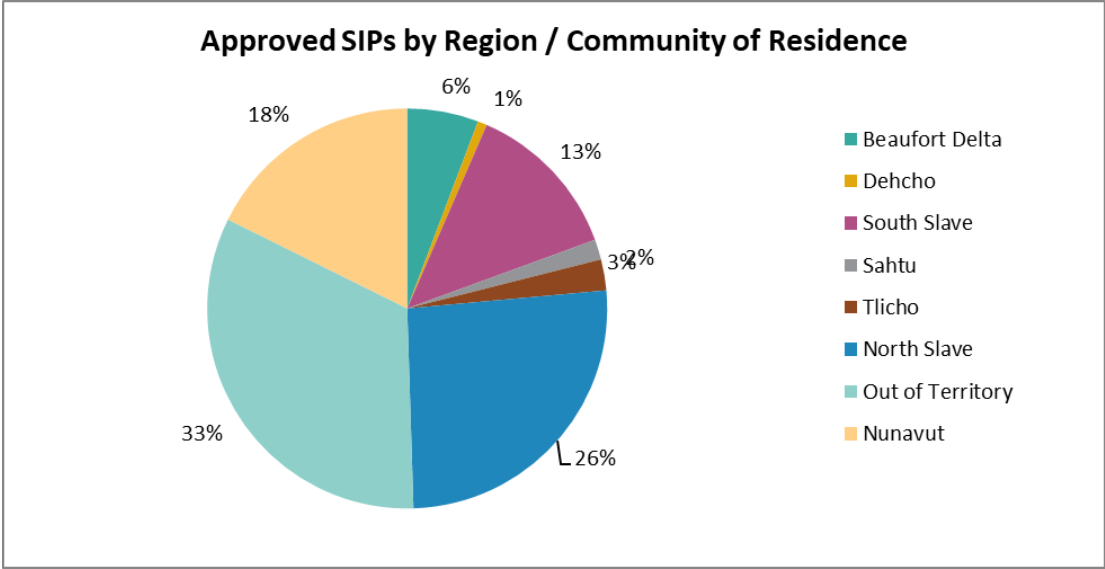
Start of reporting period: March 21, 2020

Travellers arriving in the NWT must mandatorily self-isolate for 14 days in Yellowknife, Inuvik, Hay River, Fort Smith, Fort Simpson or Norman Wells. All travellers must submit a Self-Isolation Plan with [ProtectNWT](#) and submit symptom checks on the 2nd, 6th, 10th, and 14th days of self-isolation.

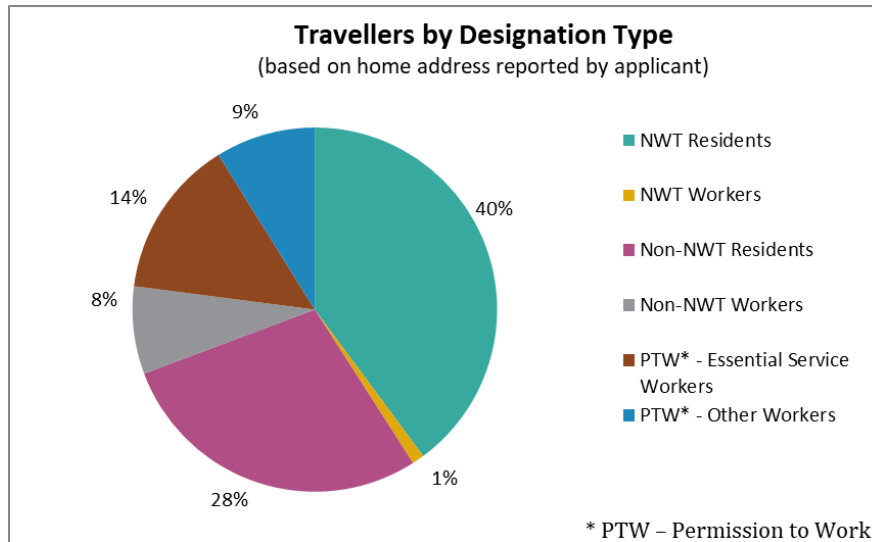

Designation Definitions

NWT Resident: a person who can prove residency through a Drivers license or GIC or other vetted document.

NWT Worker: this is a resident who has asked to work within the first 14 days upon entry back into the NWT. Examples include supply chain and flight crew.

Non-NWT Resident: are non-resident persons entering in the NWT for non-work purposes. Examples include family reunification, compassionate reasons or under other extenuating circumstances.

Non-NWT Worker: are non-residents entering into the NWT for work purposes. Examples include:

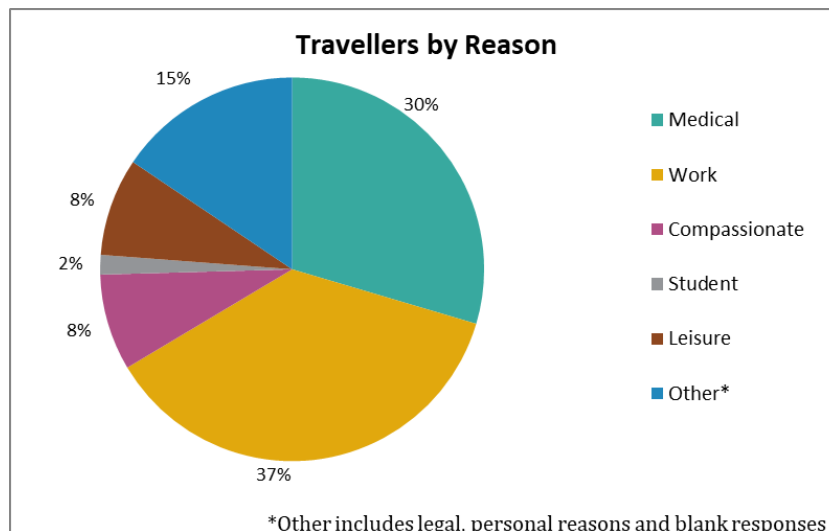
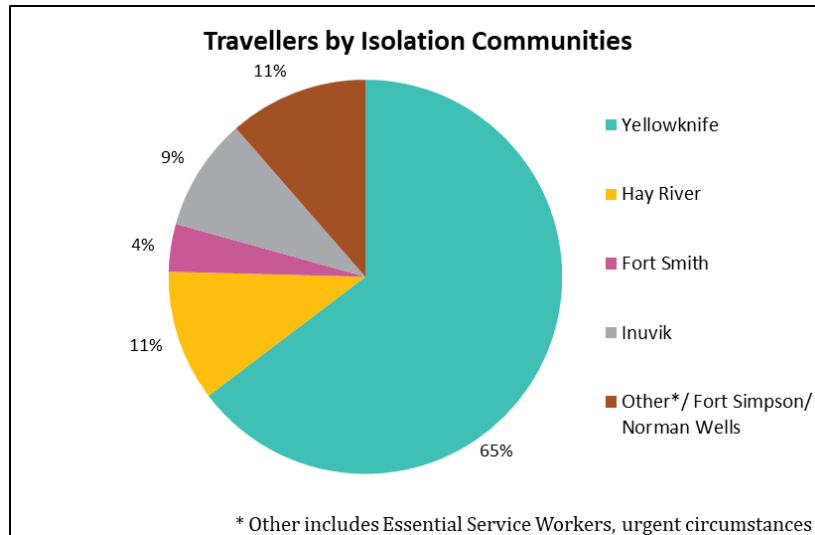
- A. Non-resident supply chain and flight crew who are here for over 36 hours.
- B. Workers who will isolate for the first 14 days before going to work.

PTW – Essential Service Worker: are both residents and non-residents ESWs (as per the categories listed under the order) whose employers have applied for Permission to work. Examples include:

- A. ESWs under the order who have travelled back to the NWT and wish to work in the first 14 days upon entry into the NWT
- B. ESWs who share a household with a person who has returned from travel out of the NWT and are choosing to isolate at home.

PTW – Other Worker: are both residents and non-residents workers who do not fall under the official category of ESWs (as per listed under the Order) whose employers have applied for Permission to work. Examples include:

- A. Infrastructure workers and other workers who are essential to their organization but who are not listed as ESWs under the order and have travelled back to the NWT and wish to work in the first 14 days upon entry into the NWT.
- B. Workers including infrastructure workers and other workers (not listed as ESW under the order) who share a household with a person who has returned from travel out of the NWT and are choosing to isolate at home.

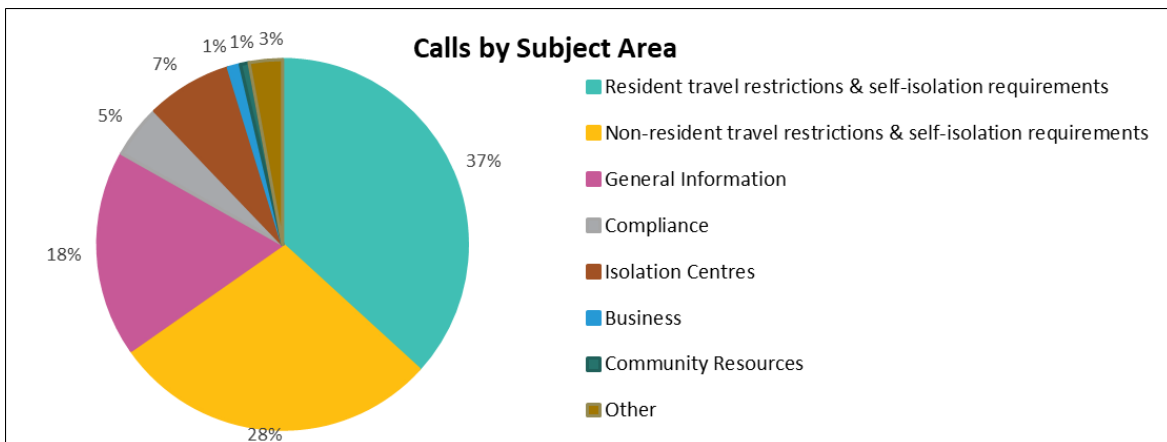
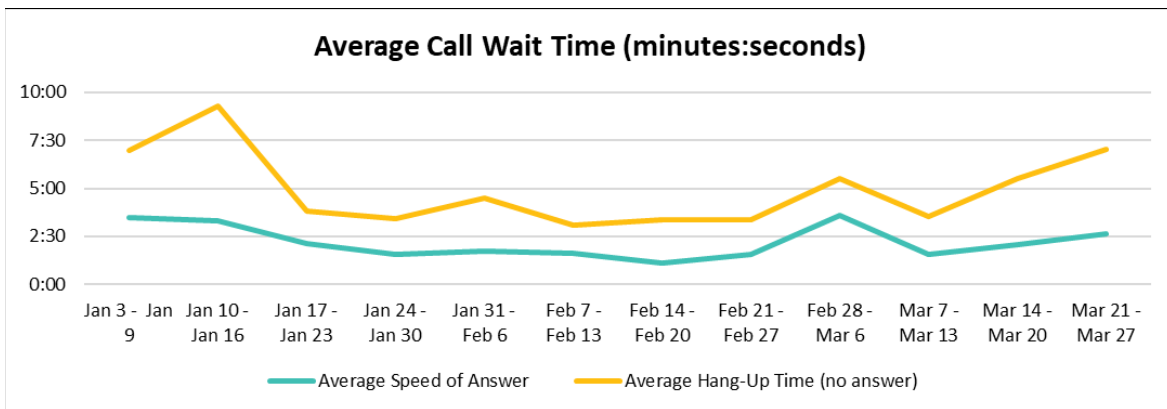
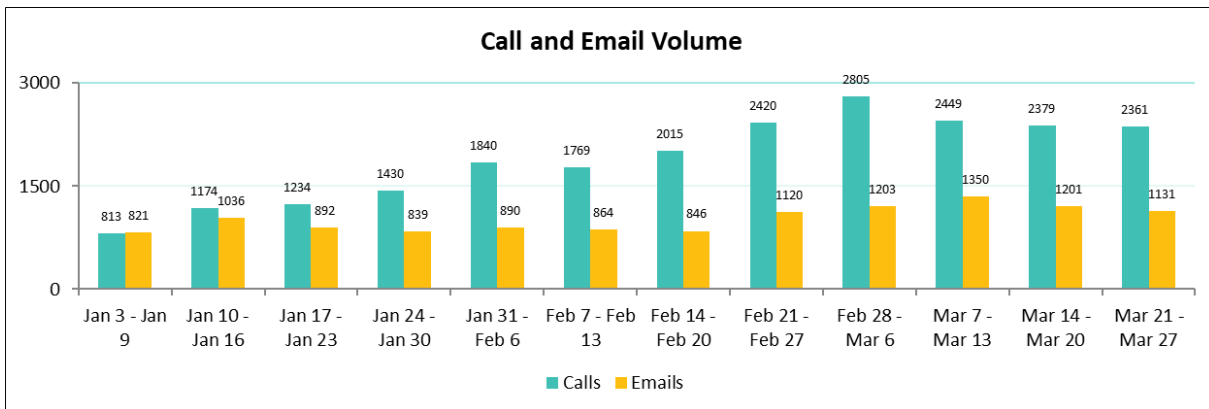


COVID Operations Call Centre

 Calls answered within 10 seconds: 42%

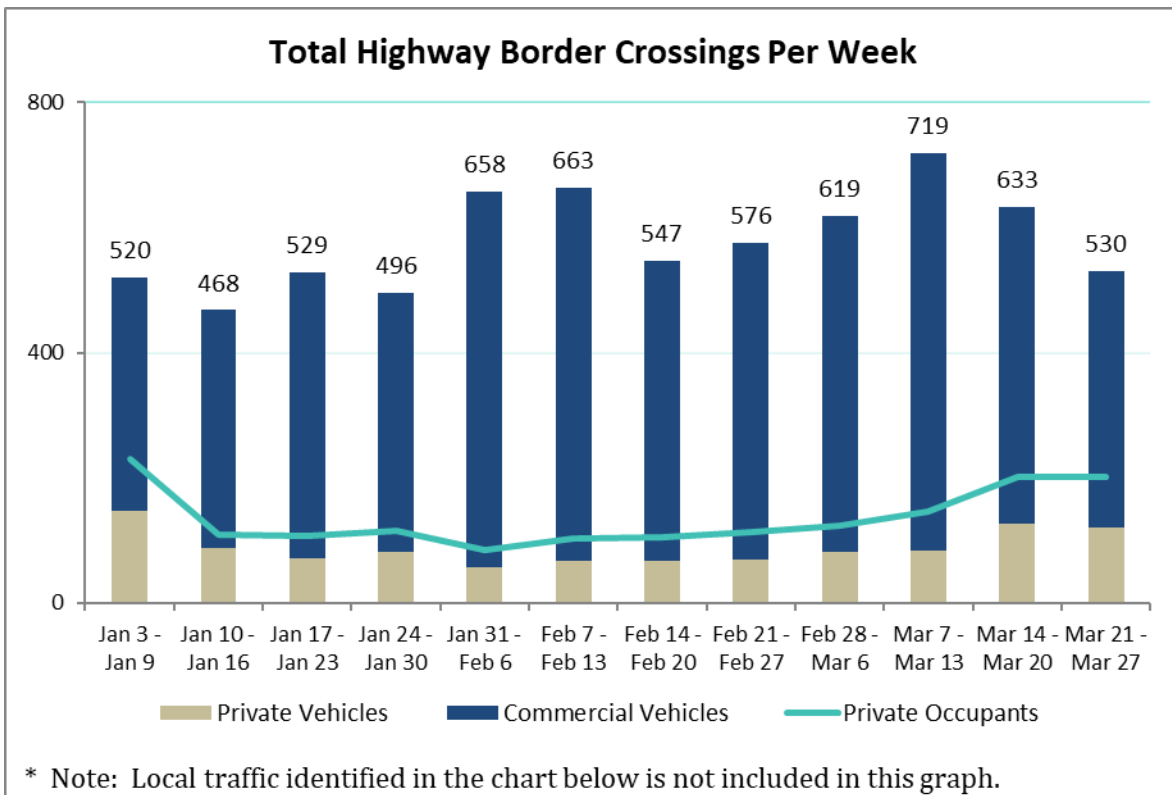


Highway Borders

Highway 1 (NWT/Alberta border): checkpoint continues to be open to private and commercial vehicles.

Highway 5 (Fort Smith): is open; however all vehicles have been local traffic under the guidelines of the [Fort Smith Border Protocol](#). **Note: recent increase in traffic is due to commercial transport of material to close the road to Fort Fitzgerald.**

Highway 7 (Fort Liard): Private vehicles may schedule exits on Tuesdays and Fridays but must re-enter the NWT through Highway 1 or 8. The Highway 7 checkpoint also facilitates the movement of essential services into the NWT.

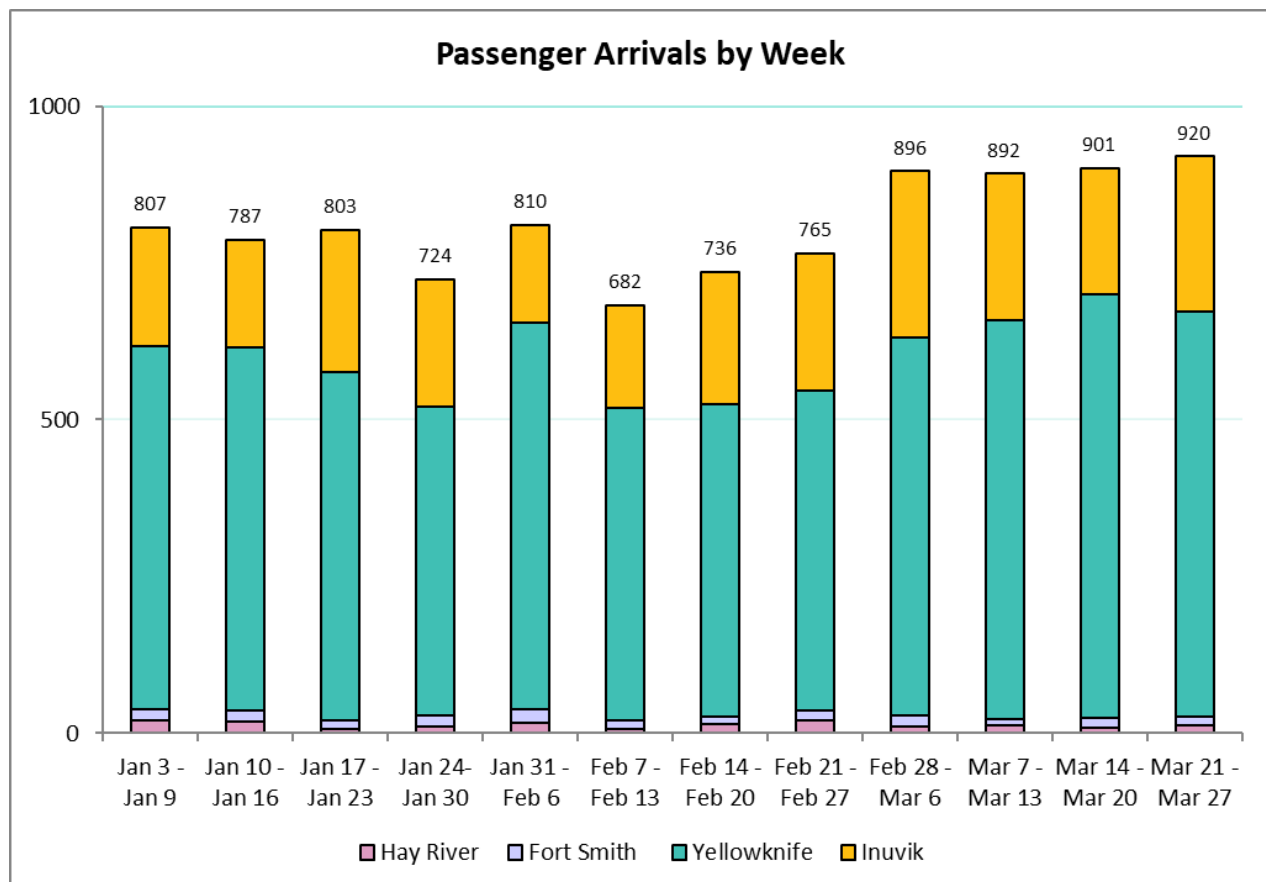
Highway 8 (Fort McPherson): On November 19, 2020 the Mackenzie River ice crossing at km 143 on Highway 8 opened. As of January 12, 2021 both the Mackenzie River and the Peel River ice crossings are open to vehicles weighing up to 64,000 kgs.

Airport Borders

Airport screening is located at airport terminals in Yellowknife, Inuvik, Fort Smith and Hay River to ensure passengers are following OCPHO Public Health Orders.

Start of reporting period: March 21, 2020

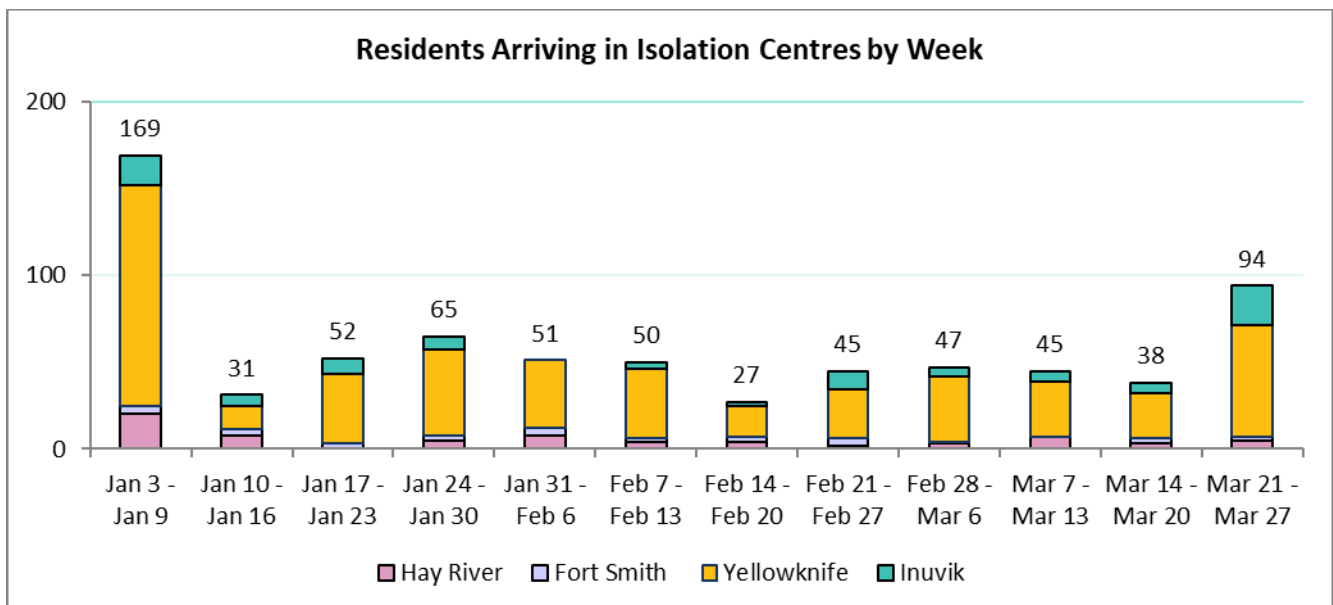
Isolation centres are available in Yellowknife, Inuvik, Hay River, and Fort Smith for NWT residents and new residents who are required to [self-isolate](#) under the Public Health Order.

Effective January 5, 2021 the GNWT no longer covers the cost for isolation centre stays related to discretionary or personal travel. The GNWT continues to cover costs for isolation centre stays related to medical travel, medically-advised self-isolation, compassionate travel, returning students, legally required travel, and exceptional, unique or unforeseen circumstances.

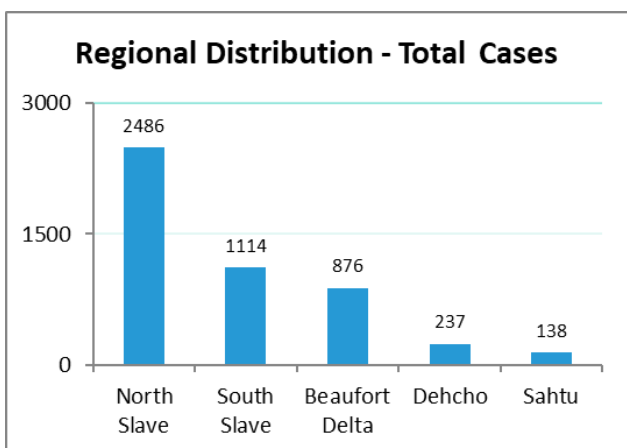
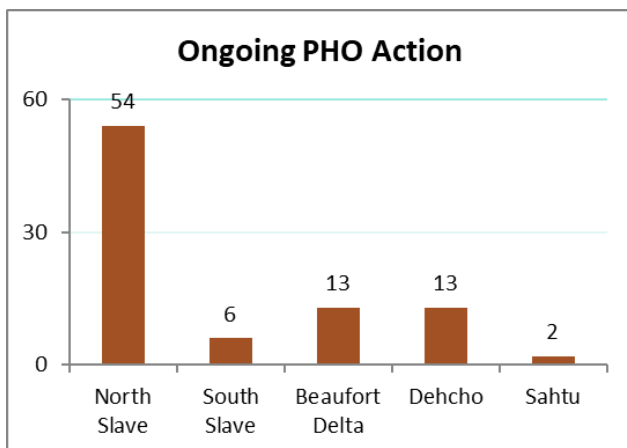
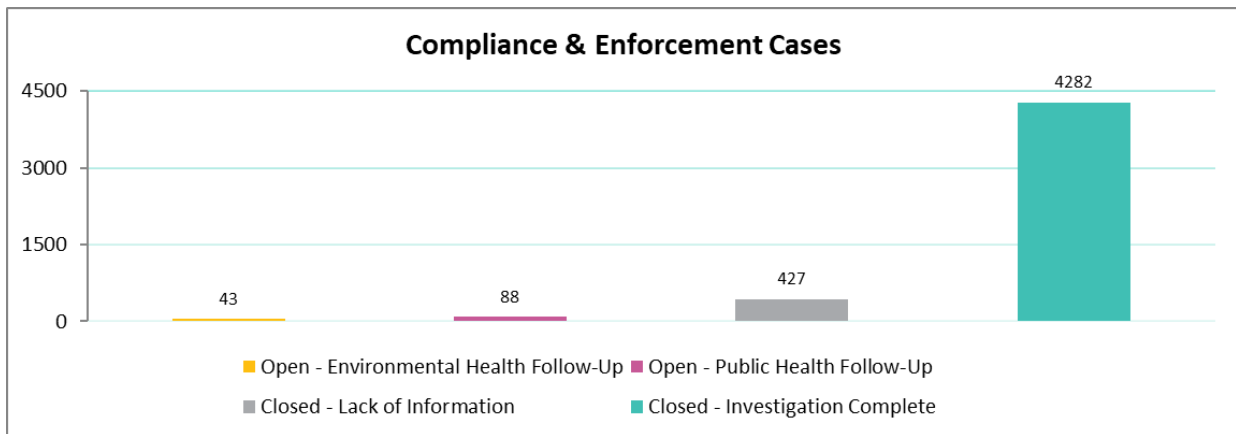
Compliance and Enforcement

Start of reporting period: March 26, 2020

Public Health Officers serve all regions of the NWT to enforce the Public Health Orders. [Compliance and Enforcement Operations](#) (CEO) staff work to educate people and businesses/facilities about the rules, investigate complaints and non-compliance, and may issue written warnings or tickets if the rules continue to be ignored.

- Compliance and Enforcement Operations (CEO) has issued:
 - 40 summary offence tickets (SOTI) for failure to self-isolate or follow a Public Health Order, each with a fine of \$1,725.
 - One SOTI for knowingly providing false information to a Public Health Officer, with a fine of \$500.
 - One SOTI to a business, with a fine of \$5,175.
- In the past week, there were no new charges issued.
- Since mid-April 2020, Regional Leads and CEO Officers have visited all 33 NWT communities, and have a presence in the following communities: Fort Smith, Hay River, Fort Simpson, Fort Resolution, Fort Liard, Fort Providence, Yellowknife, Norman Wells, Fort McPherson, Tulita and Inuvik.
 - In the past week, CEO Officers were in the following communities for enforcement or to visit with local leadership; Tuktoyaktuk, Fort McPherson, Paulatuk, Ulukhaktok, Sachs Harbour, Behchoko and Whati (attempted to enter Samba K'e, but road closed).
- Supply Chain
 - One warning to supply chain in the North Slave and Beaufort Delta.
