



Joint News Release – Official name unveiled for new all-season highway to Whatì

YELLOWKNIFE (November 24, 2020) – The Government of the Northwest Territories and Tłįcho Government are pleased to announce the official name of the new all-season road to Whatì as the Tłįcho Highway, or Highway 9.

Formerly known as the Tłıcho All-Season Road, the new name underscores the importance of this new highway for the Tłıcho region, which will provide year-round access to Whati and increase the window of access for the winter roads to the communities of Gamèti and Wekweèti.

Currently, the winter roads to Gamètì and Wekweètì can only open for the season after the winter road to Whatì has opened, which is the winter road that is most vulnerable to fluctuating conditions. With an all-season road to Whatì, the winter roads to Gamètì and Wekweètì will likely open sooner and close later.

Set to open in the fall of 2021, the new highway will help reduce the cost of living for the region and support new social opportunities, while helping attract further interest from industry in the exploration and development of natural resources.

Infrastructure projects, such as the Tłįchǫ Highway, will continue to play a significant part in the COVID-19 economic recovery. Not only do such projects inject money into the economy, they also provide business and employment opportunities for residents, while delivering the critical infrastructure the NWT needs.

The *Public Highways Act* has been updated to reflect the new official name.

Since September 2019:

- 256 people have been employed, including 109 local residents
- 97 kilometres of right-of-way clearing has been completed
- 85 kilometres of embankment has been constructed
- 48 bridge piles have been installed
- 9,599 hours of local job training has been held
